A WINTER OF LIGHT



As the days get shorter, we defy the night and darkness with the flip of a switch. The modern conveniences of electricity and lightbulbs make it easy to forget our connection to the daily, monthly, and yearly cycles of light and dark.

An Astronomical Moment

From ancient times, people have noticed that winter

means shorter days and longer nights. The loss of daylight hours is noticeable throughout the fall, but in the northern hemisphere the “extreme of winter” takes place at a very specific point in December. Described poetically by the Farmer’s Almanac as the “astronomical moment” when the sun reaches the Tropic of Capricorn, the Winter Solstice marks the shortest day of the year—and the longest night.



An Existential Threat

Ancient and medieval peoples were concerned with the existential threat posed by wintertime darkness and

starvation. From these fears emerged a variety of rituals and celebrations designed to honor solar deities and to bring life-sustaining warmth and light into hearths and homes.

Ancient Observances

The Latin poet Catullus described the Roman holiday of Saturnalia as “the best of days,” when feasts were had, social hierarchies were

inverted, and gifts—including wax candles—were given, all in celebration of the god Saturn at the time of the Winter Solstice. Ancient Scandinavians, Germanic peoples, and Celts all burned massive Yule logs to drive darkness from their dwellings on long winter nights.



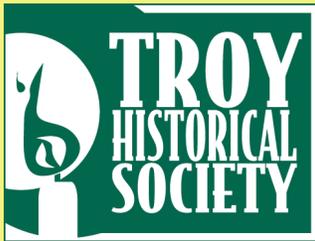
Celebrations of Light

Fall Appeal - Firm Foundations

This fall we are incredibly thankful for the firm foundation that our Villagers, Board, and Staff have built over the years. Physical buildings, collections and financial donations have been mortared together with hours of volunteer sweat and dedication. The foundations of buildings rarely get much attention, but it's those foundations that allow us to build smart, exciting, and creative programs for all ages.

Those foundations also help us weather difficult times. We are reading daily about jobs cuts, reduced programming, and closed doors across our country and especially in our cultural and arts sectors. Up to one third of our nation's museums may not survive this year. Others will lose or have already lost the talented professionals that bring their collections and programs to life.

The good news is YOU have built and continue to support a firm foundation at the Village! Your donations this spring filled a critical gap when Covid shuttered schools. It allowed us to re-envision our programming and reach out to students, parents, and teachers in new ways. Regular programming has not returned to the Village yet. If you haven't already, please consider a donation this fall to continue our mission through the spring and summer.



Grants Update

This fall, THS received a \$18,000 Operational Support Grant from the Michigan Council for Arts and Cultural Affairs and the National Endowment for the Arts. This grant will help pay the salaries for our historical interpreters and programming staff during this fiscal year. We are thrilled that MCACA and the NEA recognize and support the outstanding work of our staff in bringing quality programs to students of all ages!

Another Tale Begins

When Loraine and I sat down for one of our first meetings with Cedroni, OHM Advisors, and the City of Troy to discuss the restoration and renovation plans for the Niles-Barnard House, we brought everyone copies of Fred Barnard's *The House with Two Tales*. This book tells the stories of the Niles family who built the original house at Troy Corners, and of the Barnard family who lived there, loving the home and the Troy community for more than 60 years. As they thumbed through the book they asked if we were going to add a chapter about their work on the house.

They might have been joking, but in many ways we really are adding a chapter to the story of the Niles-Barnard House. As they've worked and peeled back layers over the last 10 months we've seen hundred-year-old wood siding patched with 1960s plywood, thick 1850s floorboards covered with newspaper and 1940s Limonium, square cut nails and horse-hair plaster mixed with art deco door knobs and modern electrical systems. We've removed some things, restored others, and sometimes encapsulated features to preserve them for a later date. We've added new paint, wallpaper, carpet and fixtures to the original pieces to create a new gathering space for new stories—a place you can gather with your family and friends to celebrate or to learn new things at a great program.



The Village and I are starting new chapters as well! As I start my time as director, I can't help but think about all the preceding chapters in my life. I grew up in the farmland of northern Indiana, one of seven kids. I wanted to strike out a bit for college and found Albion where I got a degree in anthropology and art history and met my husband Jeremy. I was fortunate to spend two summers on a dig outside Mexico City during that time, eventually researching and writing a thesis on the effects of Aztec rule on plainware ceramic production. After college, Jeremy and I married and moved to Duke where he got a master's degree.

BK (before kids) we spent a year in England where he pastored four churches and I sharpened my touring and planning skills as we made the most of our time across the pond. We settled back in Michigan and started a family. In my time at home with our kids, Celia and Daniel, I began volunteering and creating several community outreach programs through our churches. I also worked for the United Methodist church getting hundreds registered for our Annual Conferences. By 2015 I was ready to go back to school and get a master's degree in Historic Preservation and Museums from Eastern Michigan. I feel that all these chapters—student, spouse, mother, explorer, researcher, planner, organizer, and volunteer—laid the groundwork for my next chapter—director.

This is certainly an interesting time to start this new chapter, but with outstanding staff, board, and member support I look forward to writing it with you!
