

FLAGS: HISTORY, MYTH, AND SECRET MEANINGS

"People kill for flags. People die for flags. It is incumbent on us to try to understand how a piece of cloth can incarnate that power." -Whitney Smith

Since childhood, Whitney Smith was fascinated with flags. He collected anything and everything to do with them; at age 11, he even wrote to the government of Greenland to ask why they didn't have a flag of their own. As a young adult, Smith designed a national flag for the new country of Guyana, coined the term vexillology to refer to the study of flags, and created an entirely new field of scholarly research based around the hobby that would become his life's work.

According to the North American Vexillological Association that Smith co-founded, flags as we think of them today developed in China along with silk. Originally used as emblems on the battlefield, flags were soon employed at sea to identify sailing vessels. They spread through Asia and the Middle East, where European crusaders encountered them and applied their own aesthetic based on heraldry, the practice of designing coats of arms.

Eventually flags came to represent entire nations, their symbols and colors filled with meanings that vary from place to place. For example, the color white represents "purity" and "innocence" on the United States flag and "snow" on Greenland's flag.

When you visit the Village this summer, you'll see an asafo flag on display as part of the Detroit Institute of Arts Inside|Out project. Created by an unknown Fante artist in Ghana in 1863, this asafo flag would have been commissioned by a military captain as part of his appointment. According to the DIA, asafo flags were displayed on special occasions, such as the royal

yam festival and funerals. Asafo flag imagery was sometimes used to insult rival military companies!

When you look at this particular asafo flag, some of the

first things to catch your eye are probably the Union Jack in the upper left corner and eight human figures catching a fish with a large net. The flag had a secret message: when united, this Fante military company could "catch" a British fort. Had British colonizers understood the meaning of this flag, severe penalties might have followed.

In addition to the DIA's asafo flag, our collection of historic flags will be on display in July and August during regular hours. The exhibit will highlight the history and myths surrounding the creation of the US flag. We'll also offer art and art history programs related to the Inside|Out installations that you'll find all over Troy this summer, including a DIA history talk and watercolor classes. 

The Village Community

In *Troy: A City from the Corners* we record the growth Troy from farms to freeways. The "corners" refer to the three crossroad communities in Troy Township that brought those vast farms and the families who worked them together: Troy Corners at Square Lake and Livernois, Big Beaver at Big Beaver and Rochester, and Halsey

Corners at 14 Mile and Livernois. Each of those spaces had a general store, a blacksmith shop, and a small collection of other businesses and homes. The corner was the place you picked up the latest news with your mail as you chatted with the neighbors. It was the place you purchased essentials and got essential work done when you needed a buggy fixed or a pot patched. The corner was the center of a community that didn't necessarily get together often but kept an eye out for each other.

As the township grew the places people found community grew as well. Folks gathered in


churches for Sunday services and social events. Just like today, families gathered at schools for plays and concerts as well as education. Social groups such as reading circles and farmer's clubs brought people together for discussions and sharing ideas. Places like the saltwater pool on Rochester Road became a popular summer gathering spot for the community and summer dances were frequently held at May's Barn.

Even functional organizations like the Troy Township Volunteer Fire Department created community and camaraderie while filling a functional need.

One thing I love about the Troy Historic Village is that it continues to be a space for community. We've worked hard to offer

a range of activities and programs that bring together people for conversation and community. As we're emerging from the pandemic, we've heard comments like "it's so good to be back" at our monthly teas. While we offered virtual and small group programs for the past 2 years, there's just something about gathering in person and chatting with old friends and familiar faces that makes a difference. We're also working on bringing back some of the more social aspects of volunteering at the Village! Monthly meetings started in April and will continue as a way to keep those who



The Delights of Summer

June is strawberry season here in Michigan and is often celebrated by a family outing to pick strawberries. The Victorians also took advantage of the season in the way of strawberry festivals. Also called "strawberry pic-nics" these gatherings were a popular early summer pastime that dates back at least into the early 1800s and frequently served as a fundraiser for local churches and aid societies.




A strawberry festival often resembled a typical picnic. Invited guests ventured into the park or the countryside with their baskets of provisions, although quotes from the era also show that food might be provided. Charles Joseph Latrobe wrote in 1832: "Under the shade of the trees, tables were covered with the delicacies of the season, —among

which the delicious fruit, from which these Strawberry Parties took their name, was ordinarily seen in the greatest profusion, with its appropriate concomitants of cream and champaigne."

In addition to the food, strawberry festivals featured lawn games such as sack races and baseball, and parlor-style games like Blind-Man's Bluff. Entertainment often came in the form of a brass band, one-act play, or a speech, and no gathering of Victorians would be complete without dancing.

Latrobe also wrote, "A few hours before sunset, the different visitors generally assembled, by far the greater number consisting of the young and unmarried of both sexes." Like many public gatherings of the time, it would seem that in addition to enjoying strawberries, these festivals also served the purpose of giving socially acceptable venues for young people to meet and mingle while remaining under the watchful eye of society.


